We started feeding her small amounts of food every few hours. The vomiting eventually ceased. At nine months, she finally weighed three pounds, roughly what a three month old should weigh.

CAN "NO KILL" SUCCEED?

"As a tourism-based economy, Reno, Nevada has been very hard hit by the economic downturn. Its animal shelters intake over twice the national average. If there was any place where No Kill would not work based on traditional dogma that would be Reno. Past leadership said that they had no choice but to kill homeless animals and that is exactly what they did. But those leaders are gone.

New leadership has taken over and while facing the same challenges, the excuses are gone. The results have been dramatic. Since 2007, adoptions have more than doubled. Reclaim of lost strays are up. And despite taking in over 15,000 dogs and cats per year, lifesaving has reached 90% of all impounded animals, near the top in the nation.

How does a community go from killing to No Kill? "We changed basically everything," said Bonney Brown, who replaced the former Executive Director of the Nevada Humane Society (NHS). Most shelters blame the community for not caring. Instead of blaming, Bonney implemented the No Kill Equation and has achieved one of the highest save rates in the nation."

The success of the Nevada Humane Society begs the question: **Is the Maui Humane Society doing enough to save lives? With an 84% feline kill rate, we don't think so.**

According to Bonney Brown, the success of the Nevada Humane Society can be every community's success. Bonney's advice for other communities is to follow the proven methods of the No Kill Equation.

"The No Kill Equation involves low-cost/free, mass, spay/neuter clinics, community-wide trap, neuter, and release of ferals, increased foster care, animal transfers to rescue groups, medical treatment for sick, injured, unweaned or traumatized animals, a pro-active effort to return strays, and an extensive adoption program. The final element of the No Kill Equation, and the most important, is to have a shelter director who is not content to continue killing, while regurgitating clichés about public irresponsibility or hiding behind the myth of too many animals, not enough homes."

Dr. Tom Chlebeczek who used to fly over from Oahu and hold clinics in our surgery room is back. Only now he is flying in from the Czech Republic. Dr. Tom is bringing a second vet with him for our upcoming 6 day clinic in July. Call 573 3365 to register for this clinic.

Dr. Tom plans on helping 9th Life Hawaii at least 4 times a year. Each of these clinics will last 5-6 days. A lot of cats will be sterilized, so if you can donate air miles to help bring Dr. Tom here, we need miles on carriers that fly from Prague in the Czech Republic to Maui. Last time Dr. Tom was here, he told us it took 30 hours of traveling.
